## A sublime impression in the memory

Tim arranged a dinner at his house and prepared lamb with mint sauce (very English, maybe a premonitory sign of my later life). After that dinner, Hagit and I met to discuss my thesis at a café, which was in a corner, not far from where she had a dentist appointment –I think to remember. She then sent me the manuscript of The Normal Course of Events, which I printed, had bound and read with fruition. Thesis discussions followed, combined with playing Catan some Friday nights. Several months later I sent her the chapter 4 of my dissertation, which I considered to be the critical one. She sent me great feedback very generously. She had no immediate response from me, though. She emailed me again. It turned out she had sent me the comments around May 21<sup>st</sup>, the day I had my first child. How much Borer 2005, 2013 etc., has meant and shaped my way of thinking can be seen in what I write and teach. I wish she could see the admiring comments from the students of others. "Wow, she can explain how come we can say 'zero chairs'; this is the coolest thing I've seen". I do not always remember how I first met people but I certainly remember how I met Hagit. She has made a long-lasting impression in my life.
